Structure, governance and management

St. Michael & All Angels' Church is constituted as an unincorporated association and is governed by a constitution that was last amended in June 2010, adopted by the congregation on the 4th July and the 12th September 2010, approved by the Bishop of the United Diocese of Glasgow and Galloway of the Scottish Episcopal Church on 15th September 2010, with the consent of Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator being confirmed on 12th October 2010.

The temporal affairs of the Church are under the management of the charity trustees meeting as the Vestry (see Page 1 for the current membership).

The Vestry is made up of:

- six to nine elected members. Elections for at least three places are held every year. Elected members standing down after three or more years are not immediately eligible for re-election;
- the Lay Representative who is elected annually and is eligible for re-election;
- the Rector who is ex-officio and is appointed by the Bishop;
- the Secretary, Treasurer and Property Manager who are appointed by the elected members of the Vestry for three years and are eligible for re-appointment; and the Vulnerable Persons Protection Coordinator who is appointed by the Vestry with the approval of the Bishop.

Vestry members are inducted each year in front of the congregation.

As part of the Scottish Episcopal Church the clergy, all officials, the Vestry and the congregation are subject to the canons of the church and the rules of the General Synod. The Rector and Lay Reader are also members of the North West Regional Council of the Diocese of Glasgow and Galloway.

The Vestry generally meets on nine occasions each year and reviews the financial position of St. Michael and All Angels' Church and the needs of the property in accordance with an agreed schedule.

Liturgical matters are the responsibility of the Rector as prescribed by the canons.

Rector's and People's Wardens

At the suggestion of the Bishop, a Rector's Warden has been appointed by the Rector and a People's Warden elected by the congregation. They are entitled to attend Vestry meetings but are not members of the Vestry or Charity Trustees. Therefore they do not carry any responsibility for the management of the temporal affairs of the Church. Instead their role is jointly to provide a means of conciliation and communication and, as far as they can, prevent small problems becoming large problems.

For 2016/7 the Rector's Warden was Ms Jo Scott and the People's Warden was Mrs Morag Carlaw.

Objects and Activities

The objects of the Church were agreed at the AGM in December 2006 and incorporated into the constitution in 2010.

The primary object of the Church and its congregation is to share our experience of God's love with all whom we come into contact through our worship, our fellowship, our welcoming and non-judgemental attitude and our involvement with the local community as individuals and as a church congregation.

The second object of the congregation is to grow spiritually.

Summary of the Main Activities in Relation to these Objects:

It is not easy to categorise Church activities but for the purpose of this report five main areas of charitable activity have been identified, the first four of which directly support the agreed objects. They are:

- 1. The provision of public worship. This is the most obvious activity of the Church.
- 2. Pastoral care. This is a low profile but important activity by the Rector and members of the Congregation.
- 3. Local outreach and education. This includes work with young people and support to local institutions and voluntary organisations.
- 4. Wider outreach and concern. This means the world beyond Loch Long and Loch Lomond.

The fifth area of charitable activity supports the agreed objects indirectly. The church and main hall buildings are Grade 1 listed. The church is reckoned to be a fine example of design by the reputed Scottish architect Robert Rowand Anderson and is a notable contribution to the Helensburgh town centre built environment. The fifth activity has therefore been the maintenance of the church, halls and rectory.

Grants to Others

The Vestry operates a policy of allocating a proportion of our Unrestricted Income to other charities. Priority is given to local charities, those with particular connections with the Scottish Episcopal Church, and those that have a small fund-raising base.

Volunteers

Volunteers make an enormous contribution in many different ways to Activities 1 to 3 and in the management of the conservation and upkeep of the buildings. These contributions are often unseen but are vital to Church life. A few aspects of this voluntary work are mentioned in the next section but there are too many others to mention them all.

Achievements and Performance

Summary of the Main Achievements of the charity during the year:

Provision of Public Worship

There have been regular services in St. Michael's Church throughout the week every week. These are advertised on church notice-boards, and on the church web-site which has now been completely revamped and expanded. As well as the services in accordance with the liturgy of the Scottish Episcopal Church (Eucharist four times a week, and Evensong), an informal 'Open Spirit' worship, aimed at children and young families, is held on Sunday mornings before the main service.

There have also been monthly celebrations of the Eucharist in members' homes, to serve the communities in Cardross and on the Rosneath Peninsula.

There are 195 people on the current Congregational (Members and Adherents) Roll, from Helensburgh and its surrounding area, which ranges from Cardross to Cove, from Duck Bay to as far north as Arrochar. Most of those listed take Holy Communion at least once per year. The main Sunday service (Sung Eucharist) has an average attendance of about 70 adults and children, and the average total weekly attendance at all services (including House Communions in Cardross and on the Rosneath Peninsula) is approximately 120.

In addition to the church services there have been 2 home-based Bible-study groups, which include up to 25 members of the congregation. There is also a prayer meeting each week. Two worship services are held in local nursing home each month. Weddings, baptisms, and funerals have been conducted as requested.

St Michael's Sunday Club:

St Michael's Sunday Club meets in the lower hall every Sunday morning during the Sung Eucharist. A small and variable number of children attend, and the children of church members and visitors are welcomed whenever they appear. There is a small team of leaders who provide activities for the children every week, including school holidays. We aim to provide a welcoming atmosphere to any children, regular or visitors, who come on Sunday mornings. We use the material to help the children to engage with the Bible, using stories, drama, active games and worksheets.

Pastoral care:

Regular pastoral work of the church involved the Rector and several members of the congregation visiting a large number of church people, including the elderly, the house-bound, the bereaved, and those in hospital. This work extends beyond the immediate church family to people on the fringes of the church community. Some of this support is formally organised, and some is ad-hoc as members recognise the need.

Local outreach:

The Rector has acted as chaplain at Parklands School (the local school for Special Education Needs children) and at two nursing homes, where monthly services are held for the residents.

The church magazine 'The Messenger' is delivered free to a wider readership than the congregation.

The monthly coffee mornings and the rambling group provide outreach opportunities as well as the chances of building friendships and well-being. The Mothers' Union branch also provides for some community needs.

Many activities on behalf of the local community have been supported. In some cases this is done as a church, for example the voluntary staffing of the Vale of Leven Hospital Tea Bar. In other cases the support is provided by individual members of the congregation applying their Christian principles, such as in helping to staff the week-day Helensburgh Senior Citizens' Lunch Club. It has been estimated that something like 20 community groups are being supported in this way.

Support has also been provided to the local community in the form of grants, both for Christian mission and for the relief of those in need. Note 18 of the Annual Accounts provides details.

The Glasgow Diocesan Growth Strategy is all about 'outreach' and our own 'Mission Action Planning' Team supports this by helping the church to reach out more effectively into the local community. The scheme is subject to annual review by the Bishop of the Diocese.

Wider Outreach and Concern:

This has been expressed by means of the quota (currently approximately 15% of our income) paid to the Diocese & Province and collections and fund raising made for appropriate charities at home and abroad. Note 12 of the Annual Accounts discloses the quota and Note 18 provides a list of the special collections and fund raising activities.

The quota is used at Diocesan and Provincial level to fund various mission and outreach activities and to provide financial assistance to smaller congregations throughout Scotland.

As usual the congregation contributed significantly to the local ecumenical efforts during Christian Aid Week.

Care for Listed Buildings:

This has been another year of major expense with large projects carried out and completed as noted below.

The church was closed in January 2017 for 8 weeks for a complete and much needed interior redecoration, followed by a full clean through by volunteer members of the congregation, together with a complete 'relamp' of the lighting with LED lamps, allowing for a full reopening for services on the 18th March. We are however still waiting for the exterior painting work to the church to be carried out which, due to the poor weather this year, is still outstanding.

Early in the year our new interior notice board was delivered and installed at the West door and in July our exterior notice board was finally supplied and fitted on the site of the old pump room, on the Princes Street side of the church, (both projects being carried out following anonymous donations).

Following a further generous anonymous donation, during April, the Lighting and Heating throughout the Upper and Lower halls was replaced with new press button timer electric heaters and new LED lights.

During mid-May we received a formal visit and inspection by the Dean on behalf of the Diocese, during which he was very complimentary re the state and condition of our church buildings and it was pleasing to find that we were able to answer all his questions satisfactorily regarding regular checks and inspections of equipment and services.

During the year we have needed ongoing work to the drainage and roof areas including lead reroofing of an area above the flower vestry. In addition orders have been placed to carry out further repairs to the gutters and down pipes, plus work on repointing of certain walls as we are still experiencing excessive water ingress in a number of areas, over and above the general problem of water penetration through the sand stone which is an historic problem we are unable to fix. In addition we are getting water through a number of the stained glass windows, these have been inspected by a specialist and we are awaiting their report.

Looking forward, with the retirement of the Rector we now need to consider the likelihood of a need for extensive upgrading works to the rectory, before a new rector can move in. This may potentially cost between £40,000 and £45,000, but detailed surveys will need to be commissioned and proposals considered for approval.

Protection of Vulnerable Groups (PVG):

There have been no reports of any child or vulnerable adult at risk. All those carrying out communicant visitor and Sunday School duties are members of the PVG scheme. For more information please contact John Busby our PVG Co-ordinator.

Financial Review

Statement of the charity's policy on Reserves:

The Vestry has determined that the reserves in the General Fund should be at least £40,000 in cash plus the value of the expendable investments. This figure is intended to provide some protection against the risk of major repairs to the buildings becoming necessary despite the completion of the Conservation Project. It also provides a margin to cover fluctuations in income as members come and go.

More than one third of our regular gift income comes from only a dozen families. Thus our main source of income is vulnerable to the departure of certain key individuals.

Details of any Funds materially in Deficit:

No funds were in deficit on 31st August 2017.

Further financial information:

Income and Expenditure During the Year Ended 31 August 2017

The total income this year was £116,535 compared to £101,259 last year. £7,988 of this increase was in the Restricted Funds and was the result of specific gifts for special purposes. The income in the Unrestricted Funds, which must meet almost all of our routine expenditure, increased by £7,333 (7.7%) to £102,732.

The total unrestricted congregational giving increased by £5,408: pledged giving (plus associated gift aid) increased by £7,739 to £82,833 but unpledged unrestricted giving (plus gift aid) decreased by £2,331 to £8,740. Two legacies were received: one without any associated restrictions and the other specifically for flowers in the church.

Unrestricted income was boosted by three events: a talk on China by John Harbour; another Daffodil Tea at High Auchensail Farm; and one of the Stalls-in-the-Hall (most are held for other charities). Hall lets increased very slightly.

The interest received has fallen by almost £400 from the level last year (which was boosted £200 to £300 by bank interest earned during the lengthy transfer of investments from Barclays Wealth to the SEC Unit Trust Pool). Another contributor to the fall was the need to move our savings into more accessible accounts in preparation for the repainting of the church. The reduction in our Net Current Assets over the last few years has also had an adverse effect on the interest earned. However the endowment income that can be used for core church business has increased by £145.

Wedding and funeral fees were £100 less than last year.

The total expenditure increased by £6,741 to £120,820 and yet again exceeded our total income. However £17,500 of this was for the redecoration of the interior of the church and was drawn from the Conservation Fund. Another £10,129 was spent on the new notice boards and hall lighting and heating: this was almost fully covered by generous contributions by a few members of the congregation.

The expenditure from the Unrestricted Funds, which must meet almost all of our routine expenditure, fell by £8,126 to £91,606. The biggest saving resulted from the decision to scale back our donations to other charities: by concentrating on local charities we saved £5,696. Next there was a reduction in the level of emergency/unplanned building repairs in 2016/17 and almost all the main works were funded out of the Restricted Funds. Compared with 2015/16 the demands on the Unrestricted Funds were £2,283 lower. The uprating of the Employment Allowance reduced our costs by £976 and the cost of the energy used by the church reduced by £485. There were other areas of saving but also some areas where costs grew. Our unrestricted expenditure was less than our unrestricted income for the first time since 2008.

Stewardship

It is vestry policy to ask church members to review their commitment, both financial and time every four years. We had a stewardship campaign during the last financial year, the results of which are evident in this year's accounts. As shown in Note 4 of the accounts the unrestricted pledged giving increased by £5,862 (9.6%) and the associated gift aid by £1,877 (13.3%). Thus a larger proportion of the pledged giving has been gift-aided. It seems that some of the increase in pledged giving was the result of members switching from unpledged (or occasional) giving because the unrestricted unpledged giving fell by £2,245. Nevertheless the overall increase in unrestricted congregational giving of £5,408 has played a very significant part in turning the financial situation around, as have the donations to pay for the new notice boards and the hall lights and heaters.

Future Plans

We still anticipate having to spend more than £75,000 on the buildings in the next four to five years and we need to allow for this in our planning. The Vestry has decided to continue supporting other charities but focussing local ones with restricted income bases and has added another £3,500 to make a total of just over £4,000 designated for allocation in 2017/18. The Vestry has also set aside an initial £7,000 towards upgrading the Rectory. These provisions have been shown as transfers from the General Fund in Note 29 of the Annual Accounts.

Financial Position on 31 August 2017

Our share portfolio was held within the Scottish Episcopal Church (SEC) Unit Trust Pool (UTP) for the whole of the 2016/17 financial year. Over the year there was a gain on paper of £20,907 in the value of our holdings. This was a gain of 15.7% which compares favourably with a rise of 9.6% in the FTSE 100.

Our bank balances and cash in hand totalled £37,422. Allowing for the money designated for other charities, set aside for the Rectory upgrading, and due to creditors, cash reserves in the General Fund amounted to £15,216. This is well below the minimum level set by the Vestry but the Unrestricted Funds' share of the accrued Gift Aid, which is expected from HM Revenue & Customs before the end of 2017, far exceeds our short-term liabilities. The Net Current Assets in the General Fund were £32,928 ~ equivalent to 18 week's routine expenditure. This is a slightly better position than we were in on 31st August 2016 but would have been much better if we had not made an up-front provision for charitable giving and work on the Rectory.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees

Special Collections for Other Charities

In addition to the grant-making from Unrestricted Funds £3,896 was raised by special collections, sales of goods and tea & coffee, and participation in ecumenical activities.

Various Stalls in the Hall raised: £275 for WCC's Ecumenical Accompanient Programme in Palestine & Israel; £301 for Mothers' Union good causes; £50 for Eco Church Scotland; £166 for the Glasgow Street Pastors; and £115 for the East Africa Famine Appeal (Christian Aid).

Special collections raised £311 for the Bishop's Lent Appeal.

Similarly a special collection raised £228 for the Mission to Seafarers.

St Michael's contributions to Chritian Aid Week totalled £997.

Sunday morning Tea & Coffee raised £1,453 for Franciscan Aid. The object of Franciscan Aid is to relieve poverty and advance the education of deprived people from third world countries whose needs may not be covered by other agencies.

Note 20: Pension arrangements

Clergy are entitled to join the Scottish Episcopal Church Pension Fund which is a non-contributory defined benefit scheme with benefits based on final pensionable salary. The Rector is a member of the Fund.

St Michael and All Angels' Church is unable to identify its share of the underlying assets and liabilities of the Fund on a consistent and reasonable basis and therefore accounts for its contributions as if the scheme were a defined contribution scheme.

The cost of future benefit accrual has increased to 32.2%.

Accordingly the June 2014 General Synod approved the continuation of the contribution rate of 34.9%. This should result in the deficit being paid off within 9 years. A proposal to carry out a review of the scheme benefits was also approved.

There were no contributions outstanding on 31 August 2017 in respect of the Rector.

Note 21: Trustee remuneration and expenses

The Rector received remuneration, allowances and travel expenses in respect of services as a stipendary cleric in line with scales determined by the General Synod of the Scottish Episcopal Church plus the income from two restricted endowments (Note 26).
