# From the Rector

Dear Friends,

The late Geoff Hamilton (1936-1996), was very popular with gardeners in the 1980's & 1990's, when Geoff was presenter of the BBC's Gardeners World. He had a down to earth approach, as well as an infectious enthusiasm which was such an attractive part of his presenting style.

Geoff argued that a large teapot was a more vital tool than secateurs – Geoff drank tea every hour, on the hour.

He said this: "You should take off a branch, then step back with a cup of tea and weigh up the consequences before you take off another."

Something I find such an attractive aspect of gardening, is that it's so counter-cultural, certainly when it comes to timing. The McDonald's culture (i.e. instant) doesn't apply in the garden. We talk about seasons; years and sometimes decades.

I love that and such a challenge to our compulsion with immediacy. As a general rule, the important stuff takes time. Growing a garden takes years and that's the timescale we are on for developing the rectory garden. It's the same with relationships — the ones that matter, also take years. We may apply this same rule to developing our spirituality — this certainly does take years!

As we celebrate Eastertide, we are encouraged to go that wee bit deeper as each year we proclaim:

Alleluia! Christ is risen. He is risen indeed, Alleluia.

It's a slow maturing as we prune away what is less important and focus with greater clarity on what the message of a resurrected Christ is about.

# **Vestry Report March 2019**

The Vestry met on 5th March and began with opening prayers. The Rector started proceedings, covering the following issues:

<u>LITURGIES</u>. Our new Liturgies have been approved, and that the diocese had been pleased to see a congregation making imaginative use of SEC liturgical material. He thanked Richard Smith for his hard work in putting our Liturgies together.

<u>EUCHARISTIC ASSISTANTS</u>. The last 2 on our list have been approved so that we now have a full rota.

<u>WORSHIP.</u> The Rector considered that worship at St Michaels is 'well sorted'. There is plenty of enthusiasm in the congregation.

<u>PRAYER TREE</u>. The Prayer Tree situated adjacent to the font has been popular and well used. Although aimed at 'Young Church' it is available to all. We need a system to supervise it, specifically fixing new leaves and perhaps placing the out of date prayers of thanks in a 'gratitude box'.

MISSION ACTION PLANNING (MAP). There is a MAP moratorium in the diocese, at least until we have a new bishop in place. St Michaels had completed a diocesan MAP questionnaire. The Rector expressed the view that MAP never stops in that mission and evangelism is a task for all of us. There is no need for lots of paperwork, it is all about marketing the product of St Michaels by each of us extending our influence in the community by word and deed. In this way we will bring others to the church.

<u>VISION</u>. We are a Eucharistic Community, the most sacramental branch of the Reformed Church. We must strive to increase our own spirituality and our vision must be to keep drawing people into our church community.

The planned expansion of HM Naval Base Clyde will bring additional RN personnel into the area, and we must consider how best to connect with these people.

The Rector acknowledged that we don't have many children involved in worship at St Michaels. This is common to almost every church except those with an Evangelical tradition. It is not worth trying to change that; instead we should celebrate our strengths, and that we have much to offer. We will retain 'Young Church' and ensure we are 'child friendly'.

People tend to come back to religion later in life, often after retirement. Young families live busy lives these days and fail to find room for formal worship.

# **Vestry Report (continued)**

Our numbers are healthy, recent attendances were approximately: 0800 Said Eucharist 12, 1030 Eucharist 95, Choral Evensong 30. These figures are as good as the best in the diocese and our success will certainly attract more.

A general discussion took place.

Regarding RN church-goers, it was suggested that a selling point was that we are the only Anglican option in town but as many RN church-goers don't understand this, any advertising needs to make this clear. It will take time before naval families settle locally in significant numbers.

The importance of our website and facebook pages was acknowledged as a key advertising medium.

The possibility of advertising St Michaels services in the Helensburgh & Community Advertisers was again discussed. Other local churches do this, but it is expensive and local papers are not well read. It was generally agreed that a general advertisement might go in the newspaper for key events like Holy Week, drawing attention to our website for details. It would be good to have someone in charge of PR to do this.

<u>FINANCIAL MATTERS</u>. The Honorary Treasurer reported that we are in sound financial shape with no concerns, but there are no grounds for complacency. We must continue to be careful about our spending, and we need to increase our income. The Rector congratulated the Treasurer for her efficient administration of our financial affairs.

<u>PROPERTY MATTERS</u>. The following property matters were discussed:

Dishwasher. The dishwasher had been reported as u/s, water not heating properly. Engineers had been called out (at some expense) and reported that there was not a problem, the issue being a failure to give the machine sufficient time to heat the water. The Property Manager will amend the instructions to recommend the dishwasher be switched to 'heat' before the 1030 service starts.

<u>RECTORY GARAGE</u>. The planning application process is underway. Cost will be in the region of £10,000 (half groundworks including gate and access, half building itself).

<u>RECTORY WALL</u>. A tidy up and redress of the wall where stones have fallen out will be carried out in due course.

<u>BOILERS</u>. We have had one quote for £27,000. Further contractors have visited and it seems likely that cheaper quotes will be forthcoming. Additional contractors were proposed. Once we have decided on our preferred quote, we will go ahead with boiler

replacement, and concurrently apply for a provincial grant which, if successful, will go some way to offset the cost.

<u>PAINTING</u>. The importance of maintaining a rolling repainting programme was agreed. The Rector pointed out that external rectory painting was a priority; some rectory window frames have no paint left at all.

EAST SIDE ACCESS ALLEYWAY. The use of the alley for access to the Lower Hall when the Upper Hall is in use was discussed. The alleyway, which is an emergency escape route, is unlit and it was agreed that external lighting be installed (post meeting note: Fusebox have been contracted to install 2 PIR lights in the alley. The key padlock for the gate will be replaced with a combination padlock.)

<u>ORGANISTS</u>. Our advertisements for a Director of Music have proved fruitless. It is known that suitable candidates are very scarce. The organist roster is however working very well, with another recruit just joined. With 6 organists to draw on, the system is therefore sustainable for the present, on the understanding that occasionally we will have to accept a service being non-choral. The vestry recorded their thanks to David Menzies for his work to maintain the organist roster.

<u>ST MICHAEL'S ORGAN</u>: The organ was built in 1887, has had numerous upgrades and is of historic interest. We have a servicing contract with 'Harrison & Harrison' of Durham who surveyed the organ in February and reported as follows:

- For the most part organ is serviceable & reliable.
- Some areas of mechanism are of concern.
- A full day of minor maintenance recommended @£75.50 an hour + VAT
- One pipe requires workshop repair @£75 + VAT.

The Vestry approved the above to be carried out at the next 'extended tuning visit'. The probable bill will be c.£1,000.

There is a series of further non-urgent recommended jobs in the report which could be carried out at a 'full organ restoration'. There is no estimate of cost, but full dismantling of the organ is inferred. This will be very expensive. There will therefore be decisions to take regarding the organ in the next few years and we need to start thinking about this.

During discussions, it was suggested that this could be a staged restoration, thus spreading the cost. The possibility of scrapping the organ when it becomes prohibitively expensive to fix was discussed. It could be replaced with something more

modern. Others thought the organ was important to St Michaels and should be preserved. We could investigate grants. VSec stressed that this is an issue to think about for the future. The organ is fine for now and will be better with the minor improvements already agreed.

<u>VOTIVE TREE</u>. The Rector commented on the favourable response to the candles used on All Souls Day, and again on the Quiet Day when candles had been used round the font. There is an aspiration to do this on a weekly basis, using a tree shaped metal votive stand and tea lights (which would be safer than candles). This would be situated near the font and there had been an offer of it being gifted. A picture and a diagram were passed round and met with general approval. The project was unanimously approved.

<u>HALL CLEANER</u>. Our hall cleaner (Jessie) had retired at short notice. This was entirely due to family reasons, not caused by anything we have done. A replacement hall cleaner was being recruited. It was agreed that VSec would arrange a card and flowers thanking Jessie for her years of service to St Michaels.

<u>SAFEGUARDING</u>. There were no safeguarding issues to report. Our PVG Co-ordinator John Busby is planning a move away from the area and therefore wishes to stand down as PVG Co-ordinator. The Vestry recorded their thanks to John for his years of service in this important role. In response to a call for a volunteer to replace John, preferably from the vestry (because safeguarding is a vestry responsibility), Joan Thompson kindly expressed an interest in taking over as our PVG Co-ordinator.

<u>LAY REPRESENTATIVE REPORT</u>. The Lay Rep circulated his report which is available on church noticeboards and on the website.

<u>MU SPONSORED VIOLIN RECITAL & PRESENTATION</u>. Robin Barr has been contracted to play his violin and deliver a presentation on his walks in Orkney. Date in June tbc. Retiring collection in aid of MU and selected charity.

<u>MAP</u>. The reported lack of connection between MAP and congregation was raised. It was agreed that a short report on what MAP had achieved will go in the Messenger.

MISSION. A question about where we are going took place, there being a lack of children in St Michaels leading to the danger that we will simply die out. The Rector again stressed the need for personal contact in the community and drew the subject to a close by re-affirming his view that it is not healthy to become preoccupied with this and that we should instead celebrate what we do well.

### **Vestry Report (continued)**

<u>ALTARS</u>. The use of the nave altar at the 1030 Eucharist was again raised. It was reported that this was unpopular with some. The Rector pointed out that there was always the option of the Trinity Chapel. It was also suggested that use of the nave altar might be more attractive to visitors unfamiliar with the Eucharist because they could see what was going on.

<u>BISHOPS LENT APPEAL</u>. The Vestry agreed to support the Bishop's Lent Appeal for Malawi, a selection made by Bishop Gregor before he retired.

The meeting closed with the Grace.

Dear Friends, recently someone asked me what has the Church got to do with Climate Change? My response was "Surely you believe that God created the Earth and it is our responsibly to protect its wellbeing?" The Church of England is to step up its efforts to combat Climate Change and has recognised the escalating threat to God's Creation from global warming. The Church can be a very effective ambassador for fighting climate change. We are swiftly heading towards 1.5 degrees of warming with the danger of going up to 2 degrees this will spell extreme dangers to coastal regions and the increase of desertification in other areas. An interesting watch is Sir David Attenborough's programme transmitted on 18th of April on BBC one. If you didn't watch it perhaps you can find it on the iPlayer.

Lately news has come of an enterprising way to use a lot of discarded domestic plastic, nappies and plastic bags- turning it into a pothole filler. A Lockerbie company has pioneered the mix of plastic and tarmac to resurface roads and deal with potholes. Cumbria has been trialling the new compound for two years on short stretches of roads, junctions and roundabouts. The Highways and Transport director of the Cumbria County Council is very sure that the method can be used around Britain and even worldwide. Government funding has been granted and the Universities of Lancashire, California and Sunshine Coast Australia will work with the company Rebur to test the material in all sort of extreme conditions to ensure that it is stable in use.

I used to think that eating rice was a good way of helping the economies of poor countries. However, on holiday we discovered that it takes more than 5,000 litres of water to produce 1kg of rice and intensive labour whereas 1kg of wheat only takes under 4,000 litres of water and much simpler to produce. One lives and learns. On a positive note, the UK's energy use has declined by 10% in the last decade. Since 2010 alone, the UK's drop in electricity use has been the equivalent to two and a half times the output of the Hinkley Point nuclear plant in Somerset.

# **Growing with God's Grace** in Glasgow and Galloway

Way back in 2010 at the time of Bishop Gregor Duncan's election, a project was begun to assess where we were as a Church and where we should be directing our vision and energy for the future. The Diocesan Growth Strategy (using the strapline above) was subsequently launched, based around six themes:

- prayer and spirituality
- learning and discipleship
- missional leadership
- numerical growth, welcome and integration
- imaginative outreach into local communities
- children and young people

Every church was encouraged to develop a Mission Action Plan that would focus on one or two of these strands each year. After a couple of false starts a team was drawn together at St. Michael's, guided by Gill Reynolds as facilitator. The idea was to take small, manageable steps that would build incrementally over the years. From 2014 the composition of the MAP team evolved and we tackled a number of projects.

In seeking to improve links with the community, and specifically our hall users, we commissioned the triptych notice board and library at the back of church, with a panel for Mission, Community and Church. To make the church more visible to passing pedestrians, the double notice case by the church tower on West Princes Street was installed. We were grateful for generous donors who enabled this work to take place. To raise our profile on social media the church website was overhauled (and has since been further improved). Other projects included a retreat day run by the Ignatians and a training day for intercessors. A very successful Eco-congregation Creation Time exhibition, involving local schools was held in September 2017. We are still waiting for a finger-post directing visitors to the church to be erected in the town centre. This was promised several years ago under the CHORD project but has yet to materialise.

Every grand project eventually runs its course, and with +Gregor's retirement it has been decided to pause the Diocesan Growth Strategy, allowing the diocese to

take stock of progress and to wait prayerfully for the election of a new bishop. Whoever that may be will doubtless wish to make his or her own appraisal of the strengths and weaknesses of our diocese, not to be constrained by the methodology of the old Diocesan Growth Strategy and challenge us all to build on what has already been achieved.

I am sure you will agree that in the past few months there has been a positive air of optimism, as Dom has introduced new forms of liturgy, as we have seen an increase in attendance, and as we have seen innovations like the pet service and the start of ecumenical healing services. Under the guidance of Dom and the Vestry we continue to look to ways in which we deepen our spirituality, increase the church's profile in the community and seek to share our faith. In a sense we have built up our own momentum that mission action plans were intended to engender, and we look forward in faith to where God will lead us in the future.

I would like to thank those who contributed to the MAP team over the past five years. It was something Maggie Sheen was passionate about and, as a diocesan facilitator, she assisted All Saints, Jordanhill, with their MAP. Latterly, she joined the St. Michael's team and contributed from her experience. We await developments and to whatever challenges a new Bishop sets us. Who knows, some sort of development team may be reconstituted to work with the vestry in shaping our future and using the talents of the church congregation in a creative way?
