From the Rector

Dear Friends,

Now in my second year, I think it might be helpful to say a few words about how we deliver pastoral care. No system in this area is fool proof but I think we have now established a team of people who work hard at looking after members of the congregation and those who may simply be adherents but still receive care from us.

We have a 'Visiting Co-ordinator,' Sheila Baker (phone number in the back of the Magazine) and Sheila does a very competent job visiting, particularly those on the sick list. Sheila gives regular reports to Kevin and myself, keeping us abreast as to how people are.

Kevin and Joy regularly visit members of the congregation as well as keeping in touch with those who attend their Bible study group. They have run the study group for almost a decade and Kevin was the chief pastor during the last interregnum. Both have considerable knowledge of the needs of the congregation and I have often drawn on this over the past year.

As a priest I obviously offer a sacramental ministry and I would usually be called upon for, 'last rites,' when a person is coming to the end of their earthly pilgrimage. Anna and I are still making our way round the congregation with home visits and it will take us at least another year before we have visited all who wish us to do so.

A request from myself – it would be very helpful for me when asked to visit, to have that on an email or phone message. If a request on a Sunday morning is backed up by an email it's much easier to get the

details in the diary.

We now have sixteen Eucharistic Ministers, two of whom regularly take the Reserved Sacrament to the sick. Those licensed to administer Communion are also authorized for official pastoral care, most obviously to the sick and elderly.

Last but by no means least, I want to stress that care for each other is something we can all participate in. This isn't just desirable but part of our response to God's call, which started at our baptism, when we became a member of the Church. It may be as simple as welcoming a visitor into St. Michael's.

We give thanks that our community has a reputation for being a warm, friendly and caring congregation. May we always look out for the other, particularly a stranger in our midst.

Vestry Report

The Vestry met on Tuesday 2nd July and began with opening prayers.

RECTOR'S OPENING REMARKS: The Rector presented his 'opening remarks' and said that his first 11 months had been a really positive experience. St Michael's is a notably hard-working congregation. People get involved, perhaps the military ethos prevalent in the community has something to do with it.

DIOCESAN MATTERS: <u>THE DIOCESE</u>. The Primus, Bishop Mark Strange, retains oversight of the episcopacy and the Synod Clerk is the key point of contact for routine matters.

<u>NEXT BISHOP</u>. The College of Bishops, in consultation with the Electoral Synod will select the next Bishop of Glasgow & Galloway. We should expect a new bishop by Christmas.

INTERIM PRIEST. Dom Ind has been appointed Interim Priest for St Augustine's Dumbarton and St Mungo's Alexandria. The role entails participation in vestry meetings and 'rites of passage' services. St Michael's won't be affected apart from the Rector occasionally being away e.g. officiating at a Sunday morning baptism in the autumn.

ST MICHAEL'S: <u>VISITING</u>. We are a large congregation with significant numbers on the periphery. Sheila Baker's contribution to visiting was gratefully acknowledged; the routine, including the team bringing communion, works well. If someone hasn't been attending St Michael's for a while and needs a visit, or communion, the Rector, or Sheila, need to know.

<u>CONGREGATION</u>. There are often new faces evident, which is good. The need for sensitivity in the manner of welcome is recognized. Church coffee after the Sunday morning service is a very effective medium for welcoming new people.

<u>OUTREACH</u>. In addition to our excellent website we are now up on 'Facebook'. There is to be a 'Rector's video'.

FUTURE EVENTS: <u>RETREAT</u>. Tentative plans are coming together for a retreat 21-24 September 2020 at St Beuno's (St Asaph in Wales). Probably for around 20 people. Iona was also mentioned as a venue.

<u>PILGRIMAGE</u>. A pilgrimage is envisaged in early August 2021 on St Magnus Way (Orkney).

Vestry Report (continued)

FINANCIAL MATTERS. The Honorary Treasurer reported that our accounts are running smoothly with no unusually large bills since April. Our Premium account contained £40,122 and our Current account contained £21,754. Several donations had been received; one of £120 to help with the costs of our new Liturgy Books and so far £325 to help with the cost of the new boilers.

A number of fundraising activities had taken place and as a result we have given £115 to Glasgow City Mission, £523 to Helensburgh Food Bank and £213 to MU overseas appeal. We also gave £328 to the Bishop's Lent Appeal (Malawi). The Hon Treasurer recommended that the Vestry must remain cautious about taking on too many financial commitments. There were significant bills to pay, notably the bill for the new boilers (£15,423 inc VAT) and the cost of the new rectory garage.

CHARITABLE GIVING. The Vestry reviewed our annual charitable giving to local causes. The Vestry noted that the sums being discussed represented the charitable giving from church funds. The St Michael's congregation also contributes to other charities through specific events. Last year our giving from church funds was £1,000 to the Beacon Trust, £2,000 to Contraflow and £300 to Helensburgh Food Bank. A previous vestry decision had decided to keep charitable giving from church funds to an affordable level, noting that church funds have to meet routine costs such as quota, stipend and building maintenance. The charities selected are all local. Support of Contraflow represents a commitment to do something for younger people in the community. Potential alternative causes were discussed. It was agreed that the status of Contraflow and The Beacon Trust would be checked to confirm their continued suitability for our support before we commit to following the pattern of previous years' giving.

PROPERTY MATTERS: <u>BOILERS</u>. The new boilers are in place. They should be more efficient than our old ones and the control system is easy to use.

The flues which run across the creche room ceiling still need to be cladded. The job will be done by a volunteer working party, which will save us money.

<u>CRECHE ROOM.</u> The north wall looks to have a damp problem, although it might just be residual damage to the plaster from flooding some years ago. It will be investigated. The room is rather insalubrious, future use is under consideration.

RECTORY WINDOWS. A contractor is to be engaged to tackle the repainting.

Vestry Report (continued)

<u>SERVERY ELECTRICAL SAFETY</u>. The servery boiler had been left on recently. It could be dangerous to have electrical equipment left on inside the servery. The Property Manager is investigating a means of isolating electrical supplies or installing a fixed alarm system as possible solutions.

<u>TOILETS</u>. The plumber had had to be engaged to unblock the toilets. A children's toy had been the likely cause of the problem.

<u>RECTORY GARAGE</u>. The job is underway and will hopefully be completed by the end of August.

<u>BELL TOWER</u>. It was reported that the rendering/mortar is crumbling on the inside of the bell tower. The Property Manager investigated the matter and subsequently reported that the structure is sound, it was simply a bit of loose plaster.

RAEBURN MEMORIAL PLAQUE. The Raeburn Memorial Plaque commemorates the carved porch originally situated at the West door. The porch was moved to the North door when a new porch was installed at the West end in 1996, but the commemorative plaque is still on the West wall which is misleading. The Vestry agreed that the plaque should be moved.

<u>CHURCH HEATING</u>. The Vestry discussed the future heating policy for the church.

The Vestry agreed the importance of our open church policy. It is quite surprising how often people visit St Michael's for silent prayer or peaceful contemplation, which is a significant aspect of our ministry. In recognition of this it would be good to offer a warm church all week. This might also help to dry out our porous walls in winter.

There will however be an increased cost if we choose to run our boilers all week. If we are not careful, we might expect a six-fold increase in cost if we run our heating continuously because heat loss in the church is considerable.

The Vestry noted that John Sadden has significant relevant experience in this area and had written a paper reflecting previous experimentation with church heating.

The Vestry agreed that we should experiment with the new boiler, and that we should take advice from John Sadden to find the most cost-effective way to operate our new boilers.

Vestry Report (continued)

MISCELLANEOUS ISSUES. <u>SAFEGUARDING</u>. Joan Thompson had written an excellent 'Safeguarding in 2019' article which had been included as an addendum to the July/August Messenger.

<u>YOUNG CHURCH</u>. The Vestry's attention had been drawn to the unacceptable state of the creche room which is no longer fit to be used. It was agreed that the Lower Hall should be used for the creche – when required. An assessment of the stock of children's toys is intended. The Vestry authorised a grant of up to £200 from church funds for replacements.

<u>HEALTH & SAFETY RISK REGISTER</u>. The risk register was last updated in July 2017. It is important that we have a Risk Register, if only as a means of demonstrating that we have considered Health & Safety for insurance purposes. Vsec, assisted by the Property Manager, had conducted a review, from which an updated register has been presented.

TRANSPORT TO CHURCH. An article had appeared in the July/August Messenger testing whether there is demand for a formal arrangement of lifts to church. There has been no response so far, but it is recognized that many have 'ad hoc' arrangements in place which work well.

The meeting closed with the Grace.

This year the United Reformed Church decided to sell its shares in oil and gas companies, the Church of Scotland narrowly decided against disinvestment at the General Assembly and the Scottish Episcopal Church also reviewed its investment policy. We know that we have to take oil and gas out of the economy but how do we make a just transition to a low carbon economy and what is the role of finance? Join us to explore these questions. It should be a lively debate.

THE HEALTH BENEFITS OF ARRESTING CLIMATE CHANGE

One of the aspects of climate change that is least discussed is its effects on human health. There are quite wide-ranging health implications to climate change, increased number of deaths from heatwaves, natural disasters and food insecurity. When we read about climate change and health, those are the sorts of things we're usually presented with. Yes, it has all the dire warnings – the rise in temperature could reverse all the health gains of economic development in poorer countries. But it also makes a point I'd not heard before: "Tackling climate change could be the greatest global health opportunity of the 21st century".

One reason is that climate change is having an impact already, with increased extreme weather and natural disasters. All the recent floods and unseasonal weather should ring alarm bells. That has direct consequences for health and nutrition, and mental health considerations too. Another reason that climate change mitigation presents an opportunity for health is that it will require us to move beyond fossil fuels, and they are a big health risk in themselves. Cutting our coal and oil use would reduce air pollution and incidences of respiratory disease and lung cancer.

Clean cookstoves and fuels will not only protect the climate from carbon emissions, but also cut deaths from household air pollution—a major killer in low income countries. (Improving air quality would have economic benefits too. The OECD estimates that illness and premature death from air pollution costs the global economy £3.5 trillion every year). Changing the way we travel could mean a reduction in road traffic accidents.

Choosing a more active means of transport – walking or cycling – would cut rates of obesity, diabetes and heart disease. Insulating houses properly would reduce our exposure to both heatwaves and cold snaps, preventing many seasonal deaths



among the more vulnerable. With an improved housing stock, we'd have fewer problems from mould and damp, and thus fewer allergies.

The consequence of not dealing with climate change are pretty dire for human health, especially in developing countries. But as it turns out, acting to prevent dangerous climate change wouldn't just fend off that threat. It could have substantial benefits in its own right.


