## From the Rector

Dear Friends,

We often comment how quickly things change and not least with our cultural practices. Even something as basic as what we eat and drink – we were once a nation of tea drinkers! Well, some of us still are but coffee is certainly part of the scene now – just ask Ken Costa!

It's the same with retreats – not so long ago, it was almost the preserve of priests. How this has changed! People now go on retreat from all walks of life, religious and non-religious alike. It broadened from clergy to laity, from those with strong religious traditions; to those with no religious tradition at all; retreats are for everyone.

This year at St. Michael's, we are offering two different types of retreat. One is for the individual at home lasting the whole season of Lent and the other is much shorter; a residential retreat lasting a few days. One is Ignatian and comes out of a Jesuit spirituality and the other is from a Benedictine spirituality; a spirituality which has grown from the Rule of Benedict.

On page 9 of the last Messenger, there is information about the two retreats – they offer the retreatant two different experiences. The former is a slow burner over weeks; meeting with fellow retreatants once a week to touch base and then set out again alone for another week of prayer and reflection. The residential retreat is short and intense with a sense of withdrawing for a few days to a beautiful location; to take time out and dig deeply in a prayerful environment.

## **Vestry Report**

The Vestry met on 14th January and began with opening prayers.

THE RECTOR'S OPENING REMARKS included: The Rector continues to act as Interim Priest at Dumbarton/Alexandria. Dumbarton is now well into the process of advertising for a new Rector. Alexandria, with a congregation of around 12, continues to depend on Revd. Pat Smith to lead Sunday services. The St Michaels website and Social Media profile continues to serve us well. The Drumfork Centre opening ceremony took place at the end of January, and the Rector continues to maintain contact with Drumfork as a link to the naval community. We had a very successful and well attended series of Christmas services. The 9 Lessons & Carols seemed to have been particularly well appreciated with an enthusiastic congregation of around 150. Dementia is a very relevant topic these days. The Rector is engaging with the Helensburgh Dementia Centre (opposite Costa) as another outreach activity. There will be a Lent Course in the form of an 'on-line retreat' run by Helen Gibson. In summary: The Rector commented that, with 95-100 communicants routinely attending our Sunday Sung Eucharist this indicates that St Michaels is thriving and that we have got 2020 off to a good start.

MALAWI LINK: The next fundraiser is the Bridge Evening & Raffle on Friday 20th March 7:15 for 7:30pm at Helensburgh Rugby Club. £40 a table. Helensburgh Rotary may have identified an additional £1500 which, if forthcoming, would bring the total raised so far up to around £4,000, significant progress towards our £5,500 target. The Vestry agreed to a proposal that this year's Lent collection

should go towards the Malawi appeal.

#### FINANCIAL MATTERS:

We had £44,145 in our Premium Account and £18,827 in the Current Account. There only has been routine expenditure and no major bills recently. The next large expenditure is the insurance bill due at the end of March. Our new accountant has been appointed, Caroline Kerr, an independent. The Vestry approved the appointment.

**PROPERTY MATTERS**: The Property Manager updated the Vestry on the following issues: CHURCH HEATING. 1 of our 2 boilers had been unserviceable and was rectified under manufacturers guarantee. It was noted that the church is still warm. Heating costs over the Christmas period seem reasonable although comparison with previous years is difficult. The running period for church heating (Thursday - Sunday) will be extended until the end of Evensong. LIGHTNING CONDUCTOR. The annual contractor's check had again resulted in a recommendation for £1,000 of work. There is significant doubt that this is really necessary, the contractor having been engaged following a requirement from our insurer several years ago. It was agreed to seek the advice of the diocesan surveyor. RECTOR'S NOTICE BOARD. The board has been updated to reflect the current Rector. WORKING PARTIES. The Vestry gratefully acknowledged the work of the working party that cleaned the passageway to the East of the church and put up the trunking on the heating system exhaust. Next working party to tackle the re-decoration of the lower hall. CURTAINS. We will shortly have replacement curtains in the upper hall, thanks to a kind donation.

**SAFEGUARDING**: There were no incidents to report. The necessary returns and reports have been sent to the Diocese.

**AOCB**: There had been adverse comments about the 'single use plastic' artificial candles used at 2 Christmas services. The view expressed was that 'single use plastics' are not to be encouraged, that the level of light from the artificial candles was insufficient, ambience was reduced and could we therefore revert to wax candles. The reason for not using wax candles was for safety and to avoid wax spillage. The 'single use plastic' artificial candles were retained and can be used again. **NEXT MEETING**: Tuesday 3rd March

The meeting closed with the Grace.

Having spent January and February pouring over seed catalogues and choosing the best plant ideas for our gardens, now is the time to decide what to do with said seed and plants. The orders are in, carefully selected for best scent, colour and spectacular results not forgetting the need to care for our insect pollinators and bees. I read last week that in Britain we are on track to lose at least a third of our Bumble Bees of which we have 25 species. They apparently breed much more successfully in urban areas like ours than in rural areas because of the floral displays in parks and small gardens and there are better places for them make their homes in our gardens and walls. Bumble bees are usually solitary and do not live in hives. The unfortunate drive to achieve the perfect lawn by removing all weeds also removes the welcoming habitat for Bumble Bees. Clover flowers and dandelions are nectar rich food much sought after by the bees and other insects, moths, butterflies and hover flies. I even keep a small patch of nettles in my small back garden to encourage the types of butterflies (peacocks, red admiral and small tortoiseshell) which prefer them for food for their caterpillars so far I have been unsuccessful in attracting them but hope springs eternal.

The next problem is the planting medium, so many gardeners are still using peat based compost which is a resource which is not easily replaced in the wild. We know that destroying the tropical rainforests is bad for wildlife and the climate not so many people realise that lowland raised peat bogs are also vast stores of carbon



dioxide and help to slow down climate change. Gardeners use 2.1 million cubic metres of peat each year, the equivalent of 24,000 double decker buses full of peat. 94% of Britain's peat bogs are damaged or destroyed and it will take 7,000 years to replace them. Now we are importing the peat from the Republic of Ireland and destroying their precious habitats in the process.

When our elder son Andrew got his first post as a PE teacher in Walsall, he was befriended by a couple of PE teachers who had graduated from Jordanhill. This couple were like substitute grandparents to him and were very supportive to a fledgling teacher. They stayed close friends long after Andrew had moved on and got married.

In later years Andy Matthews, by now a widower and depressed phoned to say he was the last of a breed, knew no-one of his own age nobody to relate to. I asked if he knew Bobby Brown who would have been a contemporary of his at Jordanhill. Yes, he said and I told him Bobby attended our church.

On the following Sunday I gave his name and phone number to Bobby

and asked if he could give him a phone to boost him up a bit. Without hesitation Bobby agreed to phone Andy and they had a long chat about old times at Jordanhill and had a continued friendship until Andy's decease. *Margaret Horrell* 

Joan Sadden reminded me the other day of how Bobby, in his role as a Sidesperson greeting the congregation in the church porch, would always greet every man with a courteous and friendly handshake and all the ladies with a kiss. On occasion it was not unknown for certain ladies to pass through the church and out the Hall door to repeat this experience.

When my wife and I were new to the congregation, Bobby was one of those who befriended us and welcomed us to the church. In the days before I became orthopaedically incompetent on the hills, Jianping and I assisted in helping Bobby to conquer the "Dumpling" at Gartocharn by pushing him up the steep parts. What an inspiration he was to us all.

The Right Reverend Kevin Pearson will be enthroned as the new Bishop of Glasgow & Galloway at 12 noon on Saturday 4 July, at St Mary's Cathedral, Glasgow.

Bishop Kevin, who was elected at a meeting of the Episcopal Synod in January, is currently the Bishop of Argyll and The Isles and his election to Glasgow and



Galloway represents a historic 'translation' of a Bishop from one See to another. The See of Glasgow and Galloway became vacant in 2018 following the retirement of the Rt Rev Dr Gregor Duncan who had served the diocese as Bishop for eight years.

Bishop Kevin has served as Bishop of Argyll and The Isles since February 2011 and before that was Rector of St Michael & All Saints Church in Edinburgh, Canon of St Mary's Cathedral, Edinburgh, Dean of the Diocese of Edinburgh and the Provincial Director of Ordinands (responsible for the discernment and selection process for candidates for ministry). He is also currently the Convener of the Council of the Scottish Episcopal Institute (responsible for the training of those entering authorised ministry) and serves on the provincial Standing Committee of the Scottish Episcopal Church.

Bishop Kevin was elected to Glasgow & Galloway by the Episcopal Synod, a body comprising the Diocesan Bishops of the Scottish Episcopal Church. In accordance with the Church's canonical process, the right of election had passed to the Episcopal Synod, following previous processes of vocational discernment within the Diocese of Glasgow & Galloway.

Following the election at St Mary's Cathedral, Glasgow, Chair of the Episcopal Synod, the Most Rev Mark Strange, Bishop of Moray, Ross &



Caithness and Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church said:-

"I warmly welcome the unanimous election by the Episcopal Synod of Bishop Kevin as Bishop-elect of the Diocese of Glasgow & Galloway. The election follows a period of vacancy and since the right of election passed to the Episcopal Synod during the summer of 2019, the Bishops have continued to listen carefully to the views of the Diocese and to engage in a process of ongoing prayer and discernment throughout the autumn.

"Bishop Kevin will bring his wealth of experience as a Bishop to his new role in Glasgow & Galloway as well as his deep love, knowledge and understanding of the Episcopal Church. As he prepares for this new ministry, we hold him and his wife Elspeth in our prayers.

"The Bishops are aware that, in electing Bishop Kevin, this will in due course create a new episcopal vacancy in Argyll & The Isles and we will look forward to supporting that Diocese as it seeks a new Bishop."

Bishop Kevin said:-

"I am delighted, excited and humbled to be elected as the new Bishop of Glasgow & Galloway. I am looking forward enormously to entering this new phase of ministry and serving the people of Glasgow & Galloway. My wife Elspeth and I already know many in the Diocese but are also looking forward to living there and getting to know the people and the area better. We shall be very sad to be leaving the people of Argyll & The Isles which we have grown to love deeply over nine years of ministry there."

Bishop Kevin is married to Dr Elspeth Atkinson who is Chief Operating Officer for the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of St Andrews & Edinburgh. Prior to that Elspeth was Director of MacMillan Cancer Support in Scotland, Northern Ireland and Wales and for most of her career held senior roles in Economic Development in Scotland.
