From the Rector

It was an experiment to see whether Choral Evensong on the 1st Sunday in the month and Compline on the 3rd Sunday in the month, would prove to be popular. Early days but so far, the evidence from numbers is that this has worked well and will be a pattern for the foreseeable future. The exception to the rule will be Advent when we have our two carol services - these will replace Evensong and Compline. Our Advent Carol Service will be on Advent Sunday (28th November) and 9 Lessons and Carols on Advent 4 (19th December). Hopefully Evensong and Compline will continue to be well supported and that our choir goes from strength to strength.

The service which we haven't yet reintroduced is the early morning Sunday Eucharist (1970 Liturgy). I'm keen to have at least one service per week in the Trinity Chapel - this is where Anna and I celebrated the Eucharist through the Covid lockdown periods. It's a lovely place of sanctuary and prayer and in this instance, where the weekly celebration of the sacrament was maintained. I'd like the early morning Eucharist to return to the chapel and the timing of this is important. March 2022 will be 2 years since we first ceased public worship with Covid and all being well we should then be through the worst of it and be back on some sort of even keel - the intention is to resume on Sunday 6th March (Lent 1). Whether we will then be using the common cup again I wouldn't like to say but the congregation might be able to remove facemasks!!

One change that I will introduce is to switch the service time from 8:00am to 8:30am. This may encourage more people to attend and I'm particularly thinking of the winter with rather more

Vestry Report

The Vestry met on 31st August and started with an opening prayer.

RECTOR'S REMARKS: <u>ST MICHAELS CHURCH</u>. The Rector reported the recommencement of Choral Evensong from 5th September. As an experiment the plan is for Choral Evensong first Sunday and Compline on the 3rd Sunday. Mothers Union (MU) meetings have resumed in the upper hall. The diocese is looking for new MU office bearers - volunteers welcome. Our new hymn books were successfully introduced and seem to have gone down well. We have been most fortunate to have such talented organists at St Michaels. We have lost Barbara Wenborn - whose retirement was appropriately marked - but in addition to Andrew Lockhart continuing as our lead organist we now have Stephen Adam and Duncan Williams on our organist roster.

OTHER CHURCHES. The final service at St Mungo's Alexandria was sympathetically led by the Bishop. The church is now deconsecrated. It looks unlikely Revd Tina Kemp will be replaced at Helensburgh Parish church. The future of Rhu parish church looks uncertain. The troubles in the diocese of Aberdeen & Orkney continue and we should all pray for an equable resolution to the dispute.

<u>SEC GOVERNANCE</u>. Richard Smith announced his retirement as Alternate Lay Representative; we will seek a volunteer to replace him at the AGM (5th December). The role of the Diocesan Council, the changes to the NW Regional Council and their relationship with Synod was discussed. It was suggested that a simple explanation of SEC governance in The Messenger might help the congregation to understand how lay volunteers can contribute to the running of the SEC.

<u>EASING OF PANDEMIC RESTRICTIONS</u>: With Scottish Govt restrictions set at 'beyond level 0' the Vestry agreed that we should not become complacent.

It was decided to:

Continue to be vigilant and cautious.

Vestry Report (continued)

- Maintain precautions (mandatory face coverings for congregation, recording of attendance, encouraging hand sanitisation, regular cleaning of 'hand touch points').
- Although alternate pews are no longer out of use, congregation encouraged to observe sensible social distancing.
- Refreshments available after the service with 'table service' no longer a requirement.
- Church to be re-opened for private prayer.

FINANCIAL: The financial year ended on 31st August.

BANK BALANCES: Premium a/c: £40,017 Current a/c: £10,628

<u>INCOME</u>: Income from our investments over the year came to £2,581. We have received a £500 donation towards the organ from Jan Hardie. There is news of a £25,000 bequest from Rosemary Rose.

<u>SIGNIFICANT EXPENDITURE:</u> The stonework repair by ABS Masonry in the SW corner of the church cost £1600.

PROPERTY MATTERS: The water heater in the old kitchen has failed. Repair would cost £300, replacement £700. Having discussed the Rosemary Rose beguest which might appropriately be spent improving the creche area (Rosemary Rose was very involved in the creche), it was agreed that the scope of a creche area improvement project be explored, to include refurbishment of the kitchen space. Mark Duncan has kindly agreed to prepare plans for the internal work. Repair/replacement of the old kitchen water heater is therefore deferred. The external causes of the damp problem in the creche area are subject to a separate investigation. The Upper Hall area will be redecorated in late October at an anticipated cost of £5,500. The stonework in the SW corner has been repaired using a Historic Scotland approved lime mortar mix and is looking good. There have been no further plaster ceiling falls in the church building. From a check of church records such falls have been very rare, but plasterwork has been checked nonetheless and found to be sound. A water leak in the downstairs toilet has been fixed.

Vestry Report (continued)

SAFEGUARDING: There were no safeguarding issues to report.

ECO CONGREGATION: Richard Horrell delivered an appreciation of where St Michaels stands regarding 'Eco Congregation', reminding the Vestry that Synod had declared that responding to climate change by making changes is SEC policy. We hold an Eco Congregation Bronze Award and we should consider moving towards qualifying for a Silver Award. A discussion took place based on the SEC '10 points of guidance' on what more St Michaels might do, noting that we should give ourselves some credit for measures already in place (eg church heating reduced to minimum, use of fair trade products, recycling procedures and reduced waste). It was agreed that St Michaels should:

- Implement energy saving and improved insulation in our buildings whenever practicable.
- Investigate what we need to do to qualify for Eco Congregation Silver Award.
- Support COP26 by advertising for volunteers amongst the congregation to offer accommodation to delegates.

AOCB: <u>CLERGY TIME OFF</u>. General Synod had directed that Clergy/Vestries should have a discussion regarding Clergy having 2 days off per week. A discussion therefore took place. The Rector currently takes Monday off and said that he was not enthusiastic about taking an additional day. Ministry is a vocation and not just a job. The idea behind giving clergy 2 days off is in response to concerns regarding mental well-being. The Rector opined that the initiative represented increased secularization of the church. The Rector confirmed that he — and Anna — are comfortable with the current arrangement. In accepting and welcoming this the Vestry recorded their appreciation of the work of both Rector and Lay Reader, noting that this includes the strong support of their families. The Vestry also agreed the importance of both the Rector and Lay Reader having a proper break by taking their holidays.

<u>MALAWI</u>. Positive progress with the Lingadze Sports Academy project had been reported. The project, which includes the 'Helensburgh House' staff

room to which Helensburgh Rotary and St Michaels contributed, nears completion.

What can we as a congregation do to attempt to slow down the CO2 levels? Reduce waste, recycle as much as possible and turn our thermostats down a few degrees. Every little action helps.

"On my first day (March 2018) we went to a flat in town where 18yr old single mother Charlotte* and her 18mth daughter Emma* had slept the last 3 nights on a pile of clothes in the corner of a quite literally floorboard bare empty room, they were so very grateful of our donations of a bed/duvet/pillows/sheets, armchair, rugs, kitchen utensils, fridge, cooker,(*names changed) they had no support network at all, and the Universal credit takes some weeks to activate, we directed them to the FoodBank, and I gave them a WellBeing Pack gifted by the Parish Church".

"All these items had been given to us to help others less fortunate, I was just the Van Driver who actually carried the items up 4 flights of stairs and gave and accepted their heartfelt thanks, this has happened no end of times. The Christian witness of the 'God Van' driving around town delivering much needed items is well known in our community. And the financial support of the churches and individuals makes it all happen to help people who've fallen on very, very hard times".
