Structure, governance and management

St. Michael & All Angels' Church is constituted as an unincorporated association and is governed by a constitution that was last amended in June 2010, adopted by the congregation on the 4th July and the 12th September 2010, approved by the Bishop of the United Diocese of Glasgow and Galloway of the Scottish Episcopal Church on 15th September 2010, with the consent of Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator being confirmed on 12th October 2010

The temporal affairs of the Church are under the management of the charity trustees meeting as the Vestry (see Page 1 for the current membership).

The Vestry is made up of:

- six to nine elected members. Elections for at least three places are held every year. Elected members standing down after three or more years are not immediately eligible for re-election:
- > the Lay Representative who is elected annually and is eligible for re-election;
- > the Rector who is ex-officio and is appointed by the Bishop;
- > the Secretary, Treasurer and Property Manager who are appointed by the elected members of the Vestry for three years and are eligible for re-appointment; and the Vulnerable Persons Protection Coordinator who is appointed by the Vestry with the approval of the Bishop.

Vestry members are inducted each year in front of the congregation.

As part of the Scottish Episcopal Church the clergy, all officials, the Vestry and the congregation are subject to the Canons of the church and the rules of the General Synod. The Rector and Lay Reader are also members of the North West Regional Council of the Diocese of Glasgow and Galloway.

The Vestry generally meets on seven occasions each year and reviews the financial position of St. Michael and All Angels' Church and the needs of the property in accordance with an agreed schedule.

Liturgical matters are the responsibility of the Rector as prescribed by the canons.

Objectives and Activities

The objects of the Church were agreed at the AGM in December 2006 and incorporated into the constitution in 2010.

The primary object of the Church and its congregation is to share our experience of God's love with all whom we come into contact through our worship, our fellowship, our welcoming and non-judgmental attitude and our involvement with the local community as individuals and as a church congregation.

The second object of the congregation is to grow spiritually.

Summary of the Main Activities in Relation to these Objects:

It is not easy to categorise Church activities but for the purpose of this report five main areas of charitable activity have been identified, the first four of which directly support the agreed objects. They are:

- 1. The provision of public worship. This is the most obvious activity of the Church.
- 2. Pastoral care. This is a low profile but important activity by the Rector and members of the Congregation.
- Local outreach and education. This includes work with young people and support to local institutions and voluntary organisations.
- 4. Wider outreach and concern. This means the world beyond Loch Long and Loch Lomond.
- Maintenance of the church buildings, which are Grade 1 listed, and keeping the church accessible to all.

Objectives and Activities - continued

Grants to Others:

The Vestry operates a policy of allocating a proportion of our Unrestricted Income to other charities. Priority is given to local charities, those with particular connections with the Scottish Episcopal Church, and those that have a small fund-raising base.

Volunteers make an enormous contribution in many different ways to Activities 1 to 3 and in the management of the conservation and upkeep of the buildings. These contributions are often unseen but are vital to Church life. A few aspects of this voluntary work are mentioned in the next section but there are too many others to mention them all.

Achievements and Performance

Summary of the Main Achievements of the charity for the year -

St Michaels church activities were very significantly affected by government restrictions resulting from the Covid 19 pandemic. The restrictions imposed at the end of March 2020 meant complete closure of the building. The situation eased later that summer and we were permitted back into church at the end of August for our 1030 Eucharist, albeit with pre-booked attendance limited to 50 worshippers, no singing and strict social distancing. A resurgence of the pandemic later in the year mandated another complete closure of the church immediately after Christmas 2020 which lasted until late March 2021 with a gradual return to normality as restrictions began to ease. By the end of August 2021 we had re-established the 1030 Sunday Eucharist without attendance restrictions and recommenced the said Eucharist on Tuesdays. Eventually we were allowed to sing again and welcome social interaction began as refreshments after church were permitted, noting continued adherence to recommended social distancing, personal hygiene, masks and recording of attendees.

The work of the church continued despite the building being closed for much of the year with face to face activity having to cease during the periods of lockdown. The weekly service sheet, video of the Rector's weekly sermon and the Lay Reader's sermon notes for evening prayer were all made available on the St Michaels website. The church bells continued to be rung.

The activities of Church groups such as the Rambling Club, monthly coffee mornings, Mothers Union gatherings, social events have had to be curtailed due to Covid. Other 'outreach' activities such as the Vale of Leven Tea Bar have been in abeyance. ECO Baby has been resurrected in support of Glasgow's No1 Baby & Family Support Service through whom 2nd hand clothing is now distributed to families in hardship.

Covid 19 restrictions have had a devastating effect on the community in general, with reports of as many as 1 in 5 adults suffering from depression. It was recognized that the church has much to offer and the St Michaels community has tried to reach out where it can. Although pastoral care had to revert to telephone contact during lockdown, every effort was made to stay in touch with the elderly, the housebound, the sick, the bereaved and those in need.

The free church magazine 'The Messenger' has been published bi-monthly throughout the year. Financial support has also been provided to the local community in the form of grants, both for Christian mission and for the relief of those in need. Details are in the Financial Review and in the notes to the Annual Accounts.

The pandemic has affected people's confidence and despite restrictions easing it is going to take time before attendance figures at weekly services return to pre-pandemic numbers.

Achievements and Performance - continued

Wider Outreach and Concern:

This has been expressed by means of the quota (currently approximately 15% of our income) paid to the Diocese & Province and collections and fund raising for appropriate charities at home and abroad. The notes to the Annual Accounts discloses the quota and include a list of the special collections and fund-raising activities. The quota is used at Diocesan and Provincial level to fund various mission and outreach activities and to provide financial assistance to smaller congregations throughout Scotland.

St Michaels, in partnership with Helensburgh rotary, has been raising funds in support of a building project in Malawi although the planned establishment of links with a local Anglican church has had to be curtailed due to the pandemic.

St Michaels contributed significantly to the local ecumenical efforts during Christian Aid Week.

Care of Listed Buildings

2020 and 2021 have been unusual years. Although the church has been mainly unoccupied, maintenance and repair work has continued.

Thanks to a bequest from Shaun Hoey, the organ has been brought up to a high standard. The organ consists of a complex collection of timber, electrical and metal components and as such, is vulnerable to changes in temperature which cause contraction, expansion and condensation. Following consultation with our architects, we have decided to keep the church at a constant minimum temperature of 10 degrees. This is too low for the comfort of the congregation, so the Rector turns the thermostat up to 12 degrees on Saturday, when he prepares the church for Sunday Service. This is still not warm but it is an acceptable temperature and looks to be affordable. This also has the benefit that it is better for the fabric of the church and the preservation of the organ.

There had been substantial deterioration of the Stonework at the South West corner of the church. This has been neatly repaired by specialists using a material called 'Lithomix' which is approved by Historic Scotland.

We have an ongoing problem with damp in the lower east side of the church. The woodwork by the stairs leading down to the Crèche has rotted and been replaced. The outer and inner walls of the Crèche are very damp. As a result of a very generous bequest, we are proposing to redecorate the Crèche and to upgrade the lower kitchen. However, before we can do that, we need to cure the damp problem. We propose to do that by installing a porous field drain around the perimeter of the church in that area. The drain will discharge into the stream. This will lower the water table. Once that is done then we can refurbish the interiors.

The Vestry has decided to commit to one major painting job each year. For 2021 the Upper Hall Entrance, the Upper Hall itself, the Choir Vestry and Sacristy will be re-decorated.

Routine servicing, lifts, toilets etc is continuing as normal and all work is being accomplished with due consideration to the environment and our responsibilities as an eco congregation.

Achievements and Performance - continued

Protection of Vulnerable Groups (PVG):

The PVG coordinator is appointed to take responsibility on behalf of the Vestry for ensuring that the work of the Church is carried out in accordance with the Law and the Church's policies on the protection of Children and Vulnerable Adults. These policies focus on prevention and safeguarding by ensuring that anybody appointed or volunteering to do "regulated work" with children or vulnerable adults have their details submitted to Disclosure Scotland who check for any relevant criminal convictions. Vulnerable adults include those people who, because they are affected by disability, mental disorder, illness, infirmity or ageing, are unable to protect themselves from abuse, or are more vulnerable to being abused than persons who are not so affected. Regulated work could include teaching or supervising Sunday Club or providing some kind of regular welfare service to people with particular needs. We occasionally have children at our Sunday Services at present and it has been the responsibility of Vestry to ensure the correct procedures are followed.

At the beginning of each year I have to submit a Protection Record to the Diocese confirming that amongst other things we have all the correct signs and posters in the Church and Hall and that Vestry members have seen the most up to date safeguarding advice. I also have to confirm that anybody involved in regulated work has the correct level of PVG clearance and has received relevant training. Because of Covid 19, no-one else has asked to be added to the register.

PVG issues are discussed regularly at Vestry, but there have been no incidents to report since I became PVG coordinator. However, there have been concerns that some of our church family are finding it difficult to come out into the 'new normality'. To help with this I have, with the help of some professionally trained members of the congregation, drawn up a list of places where all kinds of help can be obtained and I have offered to help anyone who would like to access these. This has been displayed at all our church services since the end of lockdown.

As the SEC website reminds us "it is important to remember that it is everyone's responsibility to protect the vulnerable and everyone working in and attending services in the SEC has an important part to play in developing a safe and supportive culture within the Church that protects everyone, regardless of the nature of their vulnerability". If any member of the congregation has concerns about possible incidents involving children or vulnerable adults they need to notify the PVG Coordinator. If neither is available and there is somebody at immediate risk, the police or local social work department should be contacted.

Financial Review

Statement of the Charity's policy on Reserves

The Vestry has determined that the reserves in the General Fund should be at least £40,000 in cash plus the value of the expendable investments (the expendable endowment funds). This figure is intended to provide some protection against the risk of major repairs to the buildings becoming necessary. It also provides a margin to cover fluctuations in income as members come and go.

More than one third of our regular gift income comes from a small number of families. Therefore, our main source of income is vulnerable to the departure of certain key individuals. No funds were in deficit on 31st August 2021.

Further financial information:

Income and Expenditure During the Year Ended 31 August 2021

At the year end we had £10,629 in our current account, £40,017 in our savings account, £75 in cash, giving £50,721 in cash and bank in total. The market value of our unit trusts was £274,800.

The total income this year was £101,289 compared to £106,885 last year.

Restricted Funds, Grants and specific gifts for special purposes amounted to £3,301 (note 14).

The income in the Unrestricted Funds, which must meet almost all of our routine expenditure remained almost the same as last year at £97,988 (2020 £96,406).

It is encouraging that in the year, subject to the pandemic, our Congregational giving was £64,526 (2020 £67,766)

Hall Lets were down to £1,514 (due to the hall closure) compared with last year at £2,928. The total expenditure was £101,713 (2020 £94,127). This was due to the fact that we again kept our outgoings to a minimum during lockdown with the exception of major repairs both with the organ and rectory.

Fundraising;

Due to lockdown our fundraising activities have been down. We raised £837 (2020 £3,634).

All comparisons of income and costs with the previous year are shown in notes 2 to 10.

Overall the accounts are healthy with income covering most of our everyday expenses, a small deficit of £424 arose. In the unusual year we have had, this result is more than acceptable. However, we do not have enough income to cover large projects and expenses and for these we will have to rely on fundraising.

Stewardship:

Our intention is to have a Stewardship campaign in Spring.

Future Plans:

Having had the upper hall and vestry redecorated we would like to have the wooden floor resurfaced then we would like to refurbish the lower hall, kitchen and creche.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of St Michael & All Angels' Scottish Episcopal Church

I report on the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 August 2021 which are set out on pages 8 to 14.

Respective responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner

The Church's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006.(as amended) ("the 2006 Regulations") The Church's Trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (d) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the 2006 Accounts Regulations. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently, I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

1 Accounting Policies

Basis of Preparation

The accounts were prepared on a receipts and payments basis for the first time in 2020. They consist of a summary of all monies received and paid via the bank and in cash by the church during the financial year, along with a statement of balances. No adjustments have been made for any income due but not received, nor for any expenses incurred but not yet paid at the year end. Investments are shown at market value.

Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

The endowment funds consist of both expendable and permanent endowment funds. The income from the permanent endowment funds can be used for both unrestricted and restricted activities, but the capital must be maintained. To the extent that such income is restricted, it is shown in the restricted column, not the permanent endowment column (in accordance with OSCR guidance). Further detail is shown in notes 13 & 14 to the accounts.

Special Collections

During the year, the church made several special collections for different charities/individuals. These funds were banked and the total collected paid over to the respective charity/individual. Because the church was simply collecting the money on behalf of individual donors and forwarding it to the nominated charity/individual, this income and expenditure is not included in these accounts as part of the income and expenditure of the church. Further details are given in note 11.
