From the Rector

Dear Friends,

Easter Day is certainly late this year (Sunday 17th April) and consequently, Ash Wednesday isn't until the beginning of March (Wednesday 2nd March).

Through February our Lent book, Church and Kingdom has been on sale at St. Michael's - £5.00 (book 8 of the Pilgrim course). What it says on the back of this book is: ... we are invited to explore how we can 'follow the way', experiencing Christian faith not just as a set of things to believe in but as a way of life.

Starting on Thursday 10th March at 7.30pm, we will meet in the hall for 5 consecutive Thursday evenings to pray; reflect and debate such topics as living generously and treading lightly on the earth. After 2 years of virtual meetings, it will be good to share again in person! Do collect a book and write your name on the list if you wish to attend.

As part of our Lenten journey this year, we are having our Stewardship Campaign (27th February – 3rd April). It takes us from the Sunday next before Lent, to Lent 5, what we used to call (and some of us still do), Passion Sunday. The Gospel for the Sunday next before Lent tells us the story of the Transfiguration (Luke 9:28b-36). We are on a mountaintop where the appearance of Our Lord's face is changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. It's a mystical moment and I hope we will approach our Stewardship Campaign as first and foremost being about our spiritual journey.

Please note that we intend to have a full Easter Triduum this year. Starting on 14th April with:

Vestry Report

The first meeting of 2022 took place on 11th January and opened with prayers.

EX OFFICIO MEMBERS were elected as follows: Honorary Treasurer – Janina Duncan. Property Manager – Reay MacKay. Vestry Sec – Nicholas Davies. It was emphasized that none of these appointments should be regarded as permanent and that ex officio members should feel able to pass on their responsibilities at an appropriate time.

RECTOR'S REMARKS: <u>IMPACT OF PANDEMIC</u>. The Rector reported that he has been taking communion to an increasing number of people in their homes, reflecting their unwillingness and loss of confidence to venture out. This has both mental and physical impact (eg loss of mobility).

<u>CONGREGATION</u>. Although we have sadly lost some members of our congregation, new people have appeared and we are a growing congregation, in contrast to many churches.

<u>CHRISTMAS</u>. We had a successful set of Christmas services. The 9 Lessons and Carols (with a reduced choir forced upon us by Govt covid regulations) was recorded. The Christmas Eve Eucharist was well supported, The Saturday Christmas Day service less so. Christmas 2022 falls on a Sunday which will be better.

<u>CHOIR & MUSIC</u>. Choir numbers fluctuate and the time commitment puts many people off. We simply need to be flexible. We remain very fortunate indeed to have the support of no less than 3 supremely talented organists.

<u>OTHER CHURCHES</u>. Revd David Young retired from Helensburgh Parish Church on 30th January, to join the RAF after 7 years in post. Recruiting his replacement will be a challenge. In the SEC, All Saints Bearsden is starting an Interregnum, and St Brides Hyndland will commence an interregnum from the summer. We should remember all these communities in our prayers.

<u>STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN</u>. We had agreed to run our Stewardship campaign during Lent.

FINANCIAL MATTERS: We have £21,336 in the current account (boosted by Gift Aid income of £16,670), £40,018 in our Premium Account. The Reports from the Eco-Congregation consultant into Church and Rectory Heating cost £440.We have received a generous £500 bequest from Michael Wilson. Our finances are healthy but we have the £10,000 insurance bill to pay in March.

Vestry Report (continued)

PROPERTY ISSUES: The ECO CONGREGATION CONSULTANT'S REPORTS on the church and rectory heating had been circulated. The vestry will need to decide the way ahead. The recommendations include: Use zero carbon electricity suppliers (we can transfer when current contract expires). Consider Air Sourced heat exchangers (our gas-powered boilers are relatively new, efficient and should last another 10-15 years at least. Changing might be a longer-term consideration and grants might then be available). c) Reduce the church ambient temperature from 10 degrees to 7 degrees. (A new thermostat making this possible is on order, once installed we can experiment with settings, having regard to the minimum temperature to keep the fabric dry and the organ in good shape. The Rector will still turn it up for services). Consider Solar Panels. (will be difficult given our listed building status, but St Andrews church in St Andrews has installed these despite listed status. The Property Manager is in touch with them to see if there are lessons to be learned). Install / improve insulation and double glaze where possible. (The rectory is entirely single glazed. Double glazing will be very expensive but there are some windows where double glazing might pay dividends. Fixing the Upper Hall sky light glazing to be investigated).

<u>DAMP IN THE BASEMENT</u> We have always had a damp problem in the outside walls of the staircase and in the crèche area of the basement. We have been given a bequest which we have decided to spend on redecorating the basement and creche area, but first we need to cure the damp. The first step in the process is to install a field drain around the outside perimeter of the church foundations which discharges into the stream on the East side of the church. A contractor has been appointed.

<u>RECTORY GUTTERS</u>. Although the gutters have been cleared out by a contractor there is still a problem in one area.

<u>UPPER HALL</u>. Mark Duncan arranged replacement curtain rails and Patrick and Jenny Trust kindly supplied and hung the new curtains. Notice Boards are being refitted by Derek Spall. To save money we will prepare and reseal the upper hall floor using hired sanding machines operated by a volunteer working party. Hall Convener will be consulted regarding the timing.

<u>PANDEMIC RESTRICTIONS</u>. The latest guidance from the diocese had been received just before Christmas. Evidence since then indicates an improving situation. The Vestry agreed that continued mask wearing in church, good hygiene, test and trace, encouraging regular lateral flow testing and sensible social

distancing should remain in place at St Michaels.

SAFEGUARDING. There were no safeguarding issues to report but concern remains for those still isolated and suffering consequent mental and physical effects. Aa a trial a series of 'Men's Day' social gatherings has been scheduled.

VESTRY AWAY DAY. There is not always time to discuss issues fully during vestry meetings so a trial Vestry Away Day session was held on Saturday afternoon 15th January in the Upper Hall. Summary of issues discussed reported separately.

LINGADZE ACADEMY. The need is for books with a fairly short timescale. Pandemic restrictions preclude a fundraising evolution just now. We are in partnership with the Rotary and it was agreed that if necessary we could make a donation from church funds which will be reimbursed by means of a fundraising event in the future.

The meeting closed with the Grace.

Vestry Away Day

The Away Day was chaired by the Rector and attended by 8 Vestry members, the Lay Reader, the Lead Organist and the Stewardship Convener. We started with an Opening Prayer and the meeting lasted 2 hours, covering 4 topics. This is a note of the main issues discussed.

STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN: The Stewardship Campaign 27 Feb - 3 Apr this year. Stewardship reflects our Christian discipleship and commitment to Christ. It can be financial but can also be giving of our time to the church. St Michaels has been fortunate to have received good financial support over the years and we are quite well off compared with many churches. Nonetheless our expenses are significant as we have to meet our Quota, the Stipend, maintain and heat our listed church and maintain the rectory. It would be good to encourage as much giving as possible by standing order which allows us to claim Gift Aid (£16,000 last year). It would also be good to appeal for more volunteers to give of their time to help out with duties such as sidesmen, coffee rota etc. It was agreed that a 'light' approach is appropriate on this occasion, taking the form of a letter to each member of the congregation.

Vestry Away Day (continued)

INFRASTRUCTURE: The church halls have been redecorated to present a more modern feel. The Upper Hall now has new curtains and the notice boards are replaced. The floor resealing will be done by a volunteer work party around Easter. We have a plan to correct the damp problem in the basement/creche area by improving external drainage using the 'Rosemary Rose' legacy, then it will be redecorated. A better access to the Lower Hall will be achieved via a better lit external passageway to the East of the Church and through a new door to be installed in the North wall of the Lower Hall, thus avoiding the need to go through the Upper Hall. ECO-CONGREGATION: The SEC requires us to be 'Eco Aware' and a briefing was given in the requirements of the Eco Congregation Silver Award (We already have a Bronze Award). The criteria are listed in 4 broad areas: General aspects/Spiritual living/Practical living/Global living. To achieve the award, evidence of commitment has to be demonstrated by the entire congregation. It was agreed that St Michaels will apply for a Silver Award later this year. We will need to appoint a programme co-ordinator and we will have to convince 2 Assessors who will visit at a pre-arranged time. We need a volunteer to take over from Margaret Horrell as our representative on the Helensburgh & Lomond Eco-Congregation. HEATING SURVEY REPORTS. An Eco Church consultant visited before Christmas and has submitted reports on the church & halls and on the rectory. Recommendations are both short and long term and include consideration of improved insulation, double glazing, solar panels and possible alternative heating systems.

IT WAS AGREED THAT: (a) Vestry will seek to nominate a rep for the Helensburgh and Lomond Eco-Congregation Committee. (b) It is unfair to expect the Property Convener to take sole responsibility for implementing the Heating Survey recommendations. A sub-committee of the Vestry will be appointed to assist the Property Convener and produce a phased plan for vestry approval. (c) St Michaels will apply for an Eco Congregation Silver Award by the end of 2022. Congregational 'buy in' will be required.

PASTORAL CARE:

Restrictions imposed because of the pandemic have left some members of the St Michaels community becoming increasingly isolated. Human beings thrive on social interaction. Existing links within the congregation with people looking out for each other are important. The Rector, Lay Reader and Sheila Baker have each worked to keep in touch. Bible Group and similar groups will restart soon. The possibility of running 'The Pilgrim Course' during mid-week evenings was

discussed. All these things are effective, but what more can be done? (a) The first 'MEN'S GROUP' events have taken place. (b) COFFEE AFTER SERVICES has recommenced, which is a valued opportunity for social interaction. (c) EASING OF PANDEMIC RESTRICTIONS should enable our social programme to recommence. (d) Every member of the congregation could be encouraged to make contact with someone isolated. 'Look out for each other'. (e) The delivery of 'The Messenger' affords an opportunity to knock on the doors of the isolated. We might formalise this by sharing out delivery in local areas. (f) What lessons have we learned from lockdown?

DIRECTION OF TRAVEL: The Rector started by reminding us that Christianity is the biggest and fastest growing religion in the world, however it is in decline in Northern Europe especially in national churches. In the UK the independent evangelical churches are doing well. In the Anglican church, the 'Evangelicals' are flourishing and the Medieval Cathedrals offering traditional Book of Common Prayer worship are doing well. Parish churches with one minister running 3 or 4 churches are struggling. In Scotland the Church of Scotland is in some difficulty, reflected in Helensburgh where the parish church is about to lose its Minister, while there are question marks about Rhu & Shandon. Bethesda and the Baptists are flourishing, however. St Michaels' strength is in offering a highly liturgical, sacramental Anglican package in the reformed tradition, something unique and distinct.

<u>WHAT DO WE DO WELL?</u> (a) Strong attendances - we are seen as the 'Anglican Cathedral of Argyll'. (b) Music, choir supported by excellent organists and a fine organ. (c) Choral Evensong and Compline which is unique in our area.

OTHER ISSUES WERE RAISED: (a) Should we offer a non-Eucharistic service? Might be attractive to the young who are put off by formality. (b) Will we bring back the early morning Eucharist? Will re-start on Sundays in Lent, 0830. (c) Ecumenism. Has been a challenge locally but the interregnum in the Parish Church may present an opportunity. (d) It was agreed that this had been a useful exercise. For consideration in the future, we might debate the challenge of being a Christian in a secular society where standards of morality have changed.

The meeting closed with The Grace.

It is easy to feel overwhelmed by the state of the environment and wonder what we can do about it. There are quite a few relatively small changes that can be made which will help improve the environment. One simple change could be the choice of Cleaning Products! Most cleaning products are contained in single use plastic and contain chemicals which are harmful to humans and toxic to the environment. I have not suffered from dermatitis since I changed over to Eco brands. "The hands that do dishes—-"so the advert went was misleading at best. Eco products are sometimes difficult to find in supermarkets as they are often not in a prominent position on the shelves.

Shopping is another area in which we can make a difference by avoiding prepackaged food. Choosing the local fishmonger, greengrocer, butcher and refill shops over the supermarket. Using recycled toilet rolls and kitchen rolls instead of the big named brands, saves trees the big carbon absorbers. Where possible choosing organically produced food and of course Fair-Traded goods.

Property Matters

We should all have fitted new radio linked fire, smoke and Carbon monoxide alarms in our homes by 1st Feb. The rectory has been done.

A contract has been let for the installation of a field drain to reduce damp in the lowest part of our Church, the crèche and staircase.

I have been trying to get permission from the Local Authority planners to convert a window in the lower hall into a door and window. However, Howard Young, the Chief Planner, has not yet responded to my requests. I will keep pressing him.

As you all know, energy costs have gone through the roof. The Church already has an 'Eco Congregation' initiative in place to reduce our Carbon Footprint. We have had a report prepared by Andrew McOwan, which has given us advice as to how we should go about that. We are looking at insulation, solar panels and air sourced heat exchangers. These are all expensive items and will probably not be affordable unless we can get grants or soft loans. I am happy to do the hardware side, but I would like help on the Grant side. If anyone out there could help, that would be great. The Government is already planning on handing out money.

We have been running the heating in the Church at a minimum of 10 degrees. Dom tweaks the thermostat on Saturday so that the church is comfortable for Sunday Service and turns it down again afterwards. The result of this policy is that the walls are not damp and the area round the Lectern is not speckled with paint that has fallen off the ceiling. The Organ will last longer. However, Andrew McOwan has advised us that we could run at a minimum temperature of 7 or 8 degrees and achieve the same result. Unfortunately, the thermostat only goes down to 10 Degrees, so I have asked Fusebox to fit a new thermostat.

Q. Is there any other trivia I haven't asked which you'd like to add?


A. Can't think of one just now, thanks.
